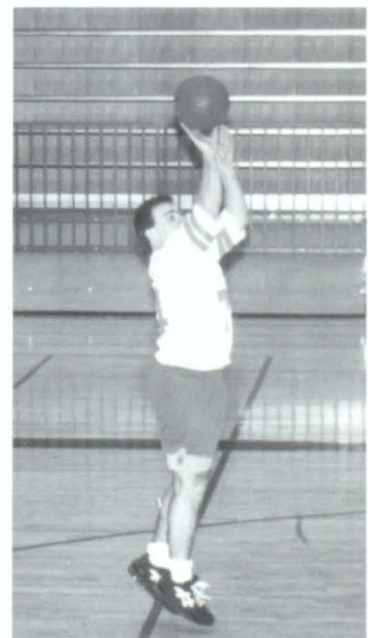

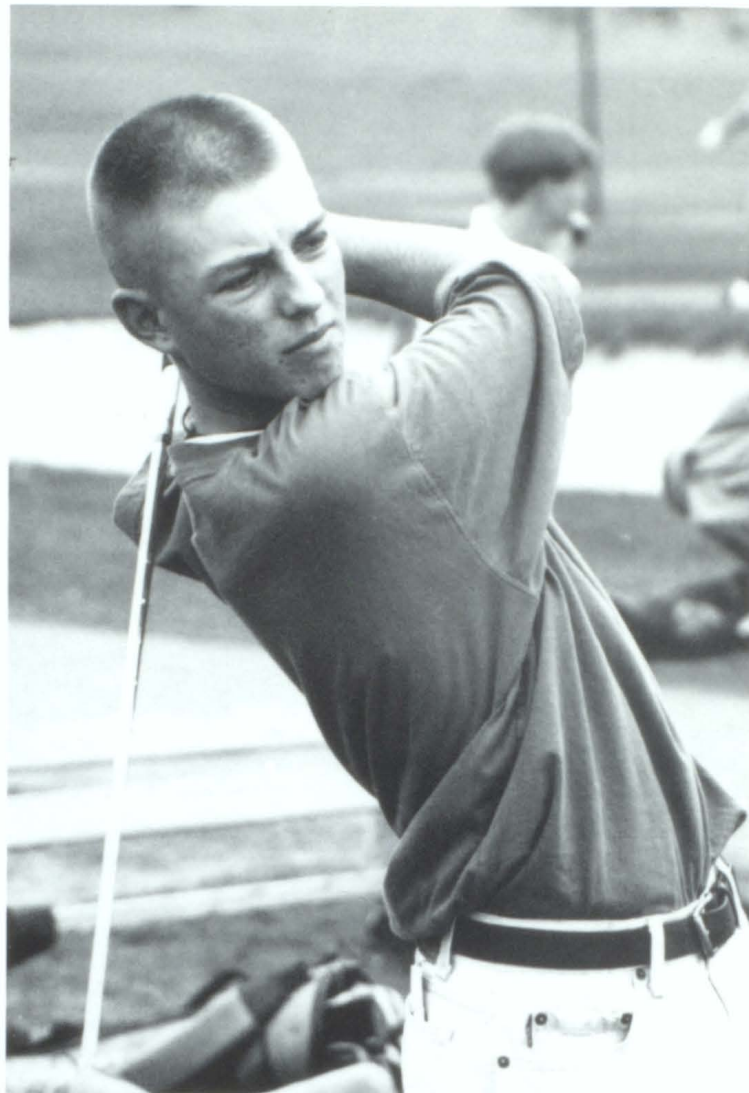

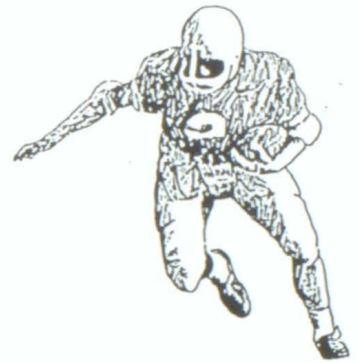


Junior Jason Lukas gains yards on his kick off return.

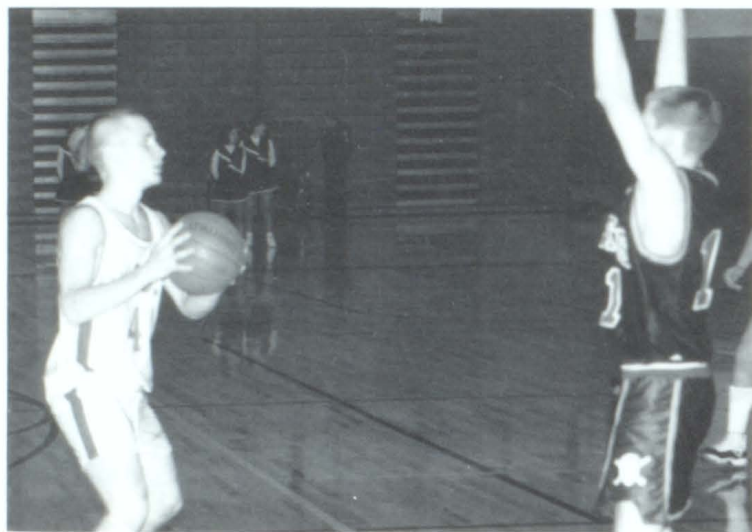

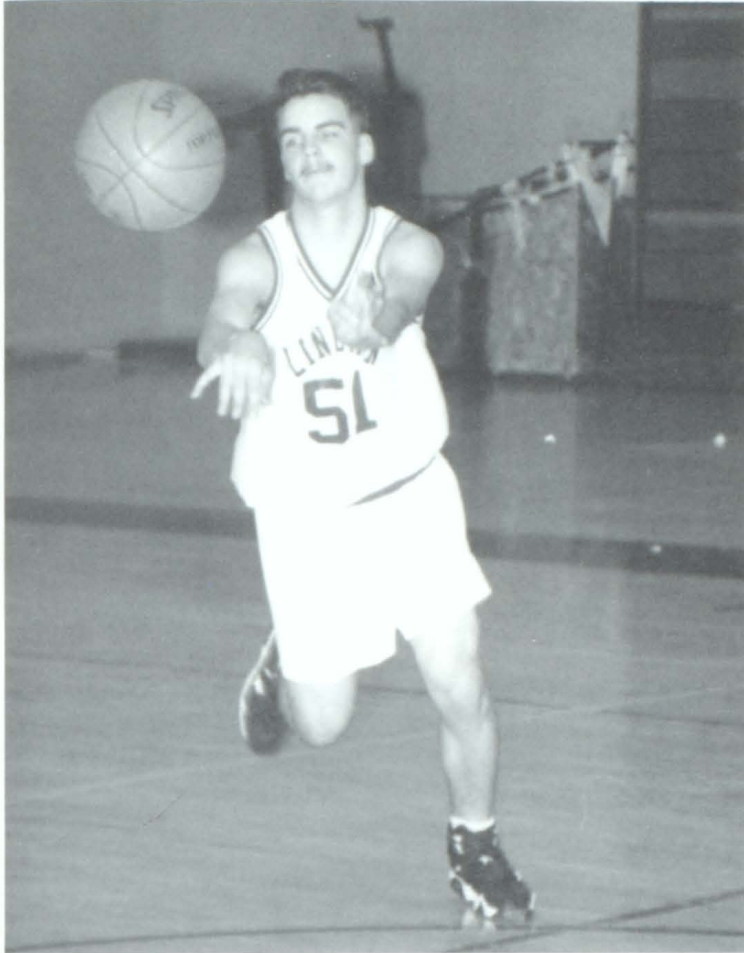

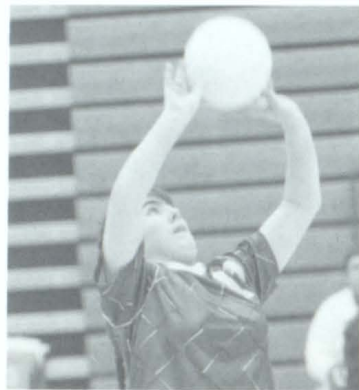

Power digger Eila Kvaran digs up an opponent's kill, putting it back into play for the Railsplitter team.

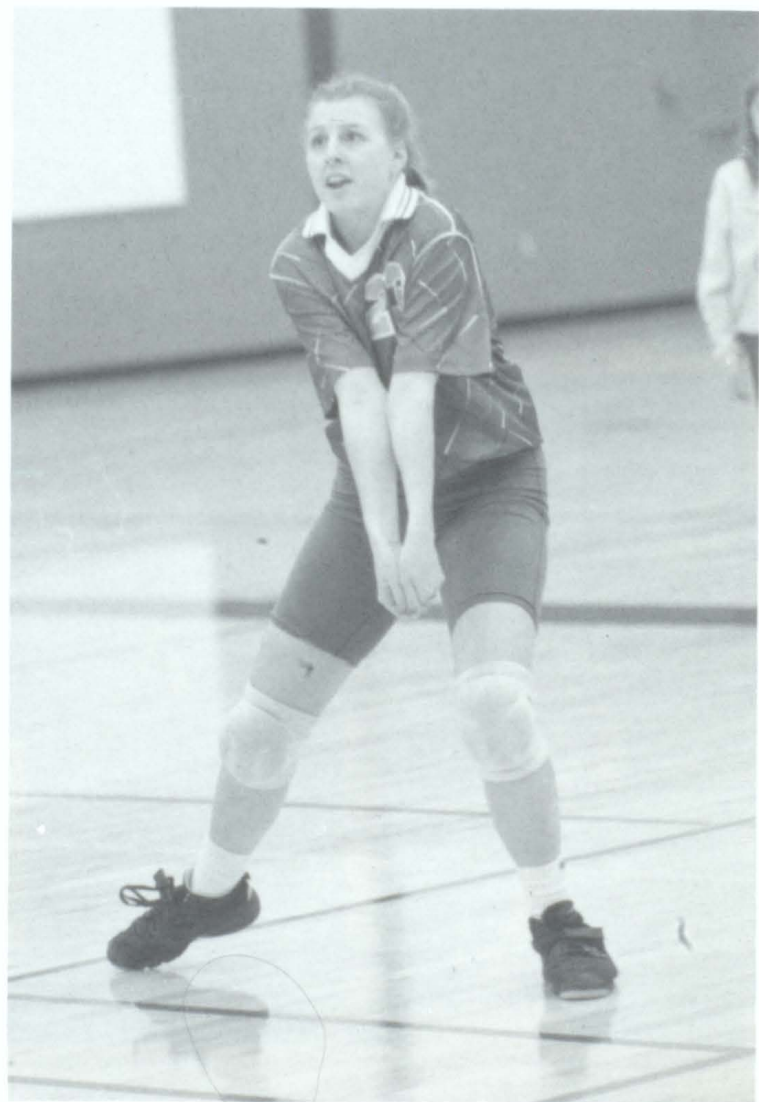

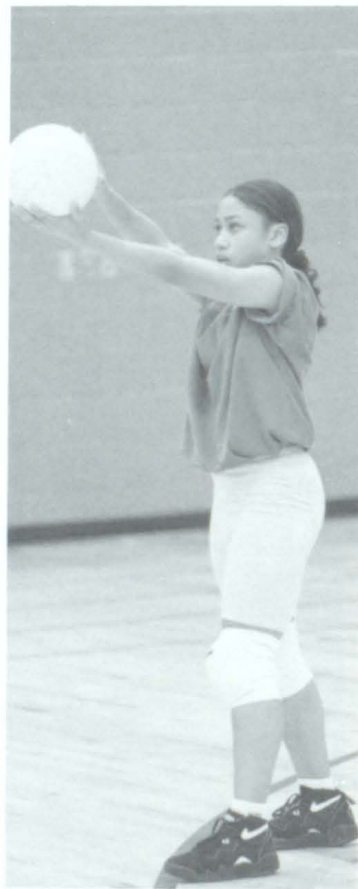

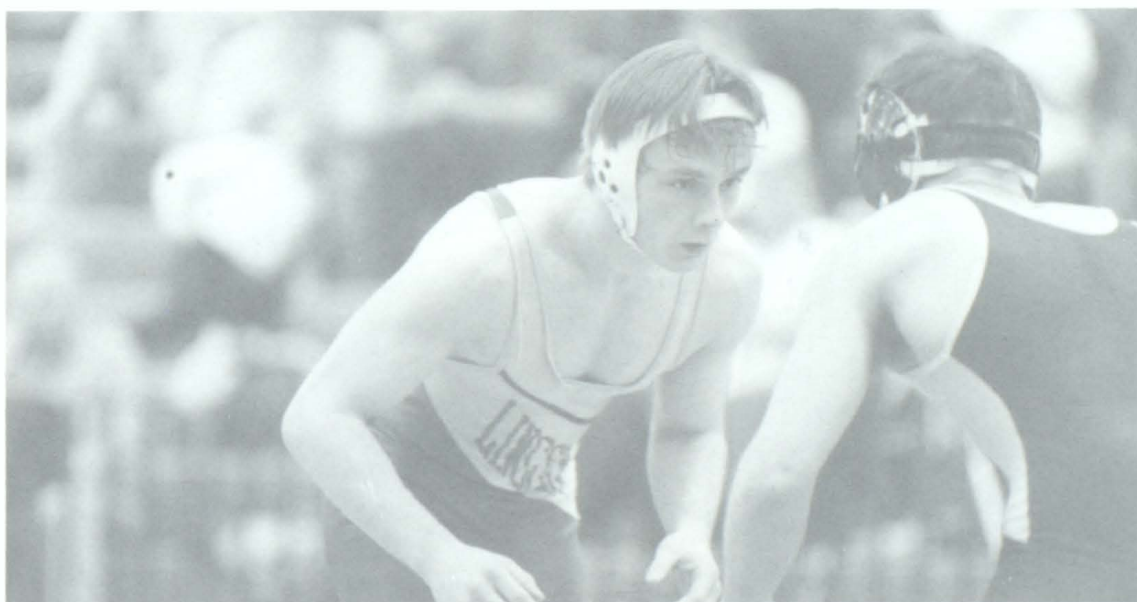

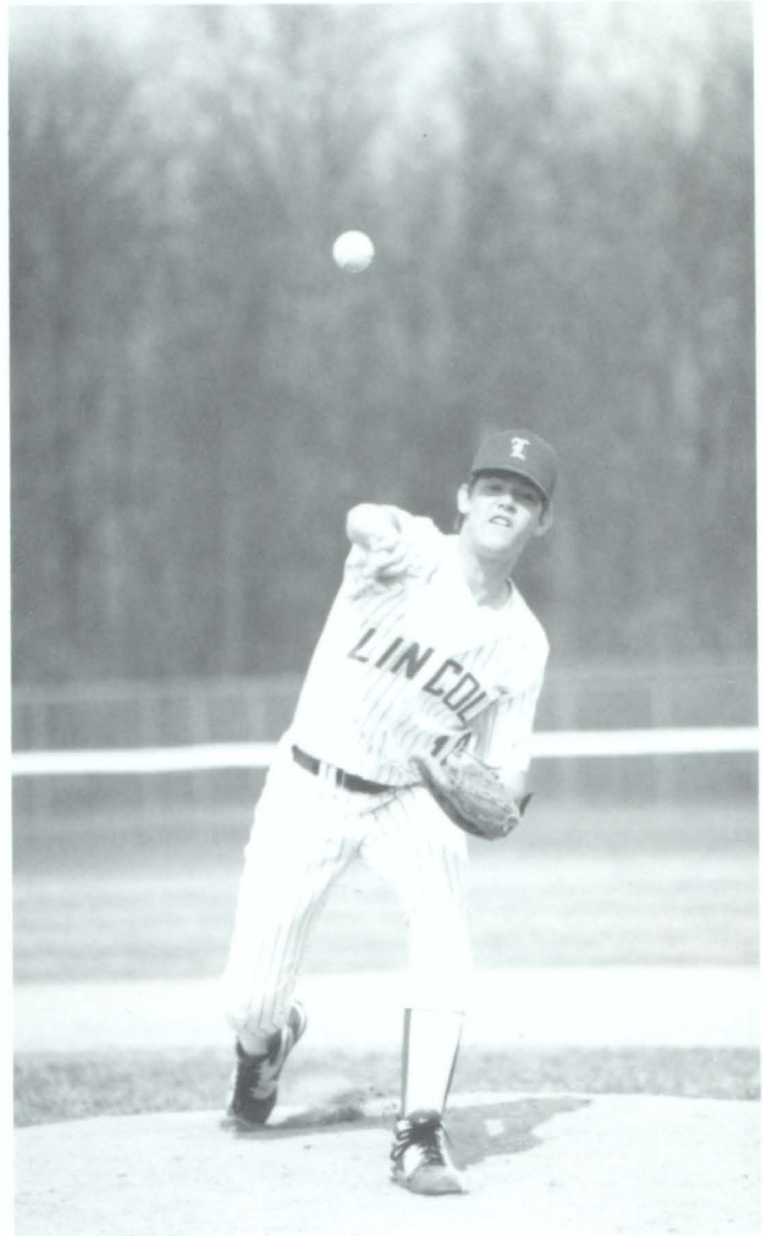

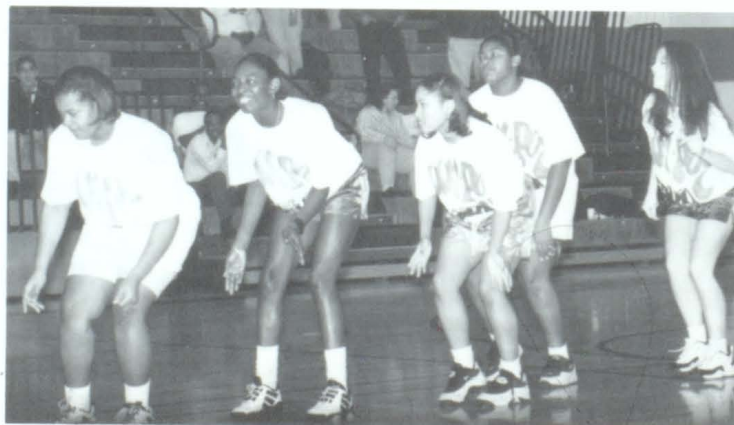

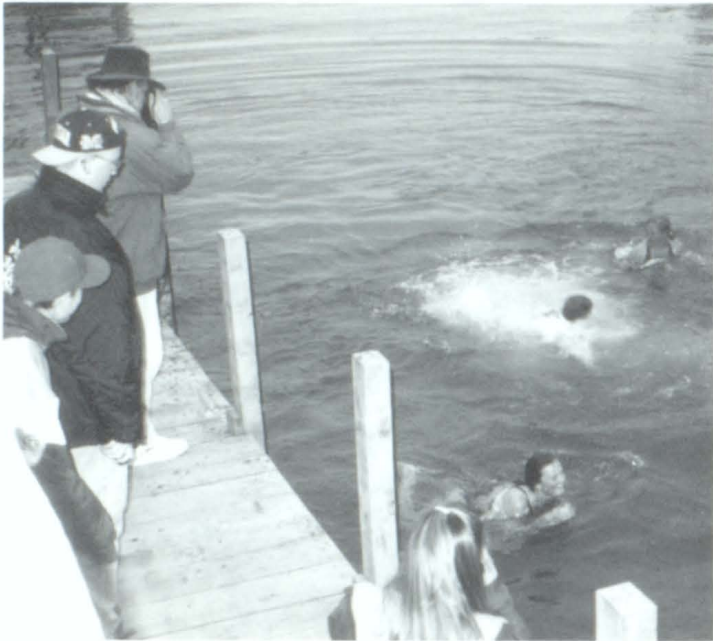


Spanish And German Students Come To Lincoln.

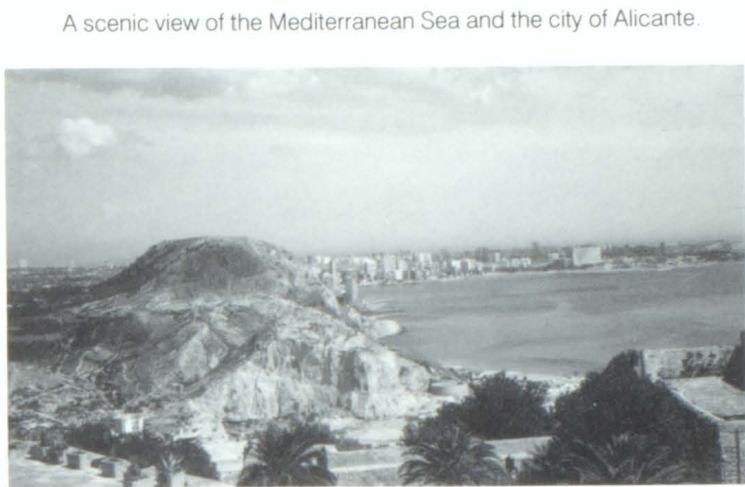

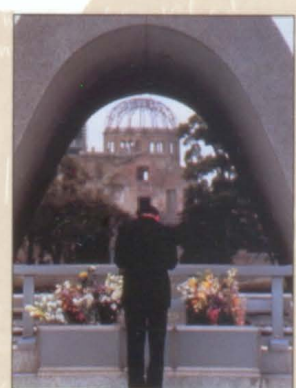

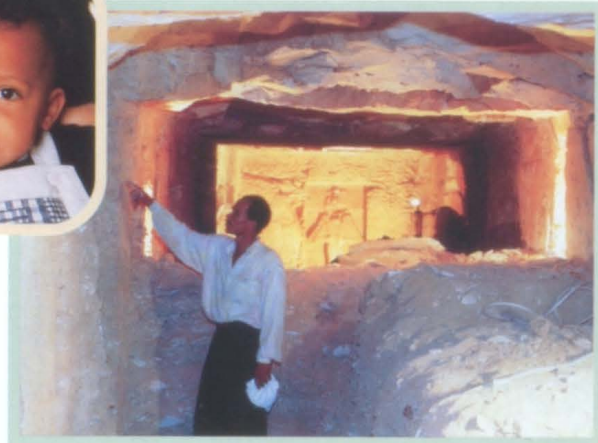
