

The evening was capped with a 20 minute fireworks display. A "birthday" celebration was held the following afternoon.








There is a lot that goes into a drama production. From set construction to costumes to make-up to casting- all together it's about a two month process until preparations for a performance are complete.







Welcome back Cominghome Court! The ban on hall decorating and winter semi-formal was lifted, which meant hot boys in suits that never seem to fit right.


Court starts out with girls running around with nomination sheets trying to get signatures to get their best beaus some press coverage.










As white lights, gazebos and park benches filled the hall, students gathered in the darkened room to dance, socialize and gather in their formal attire.


















