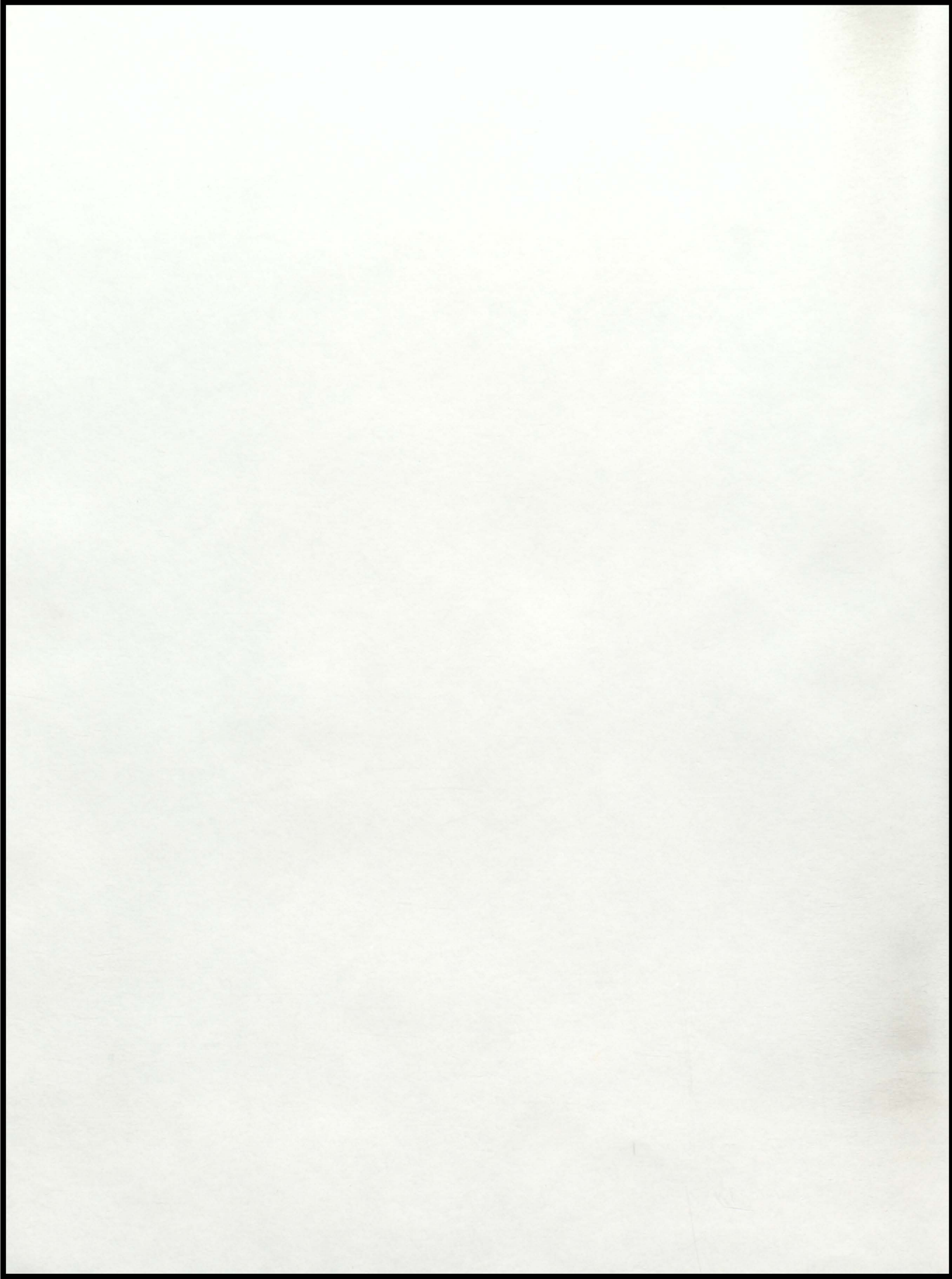

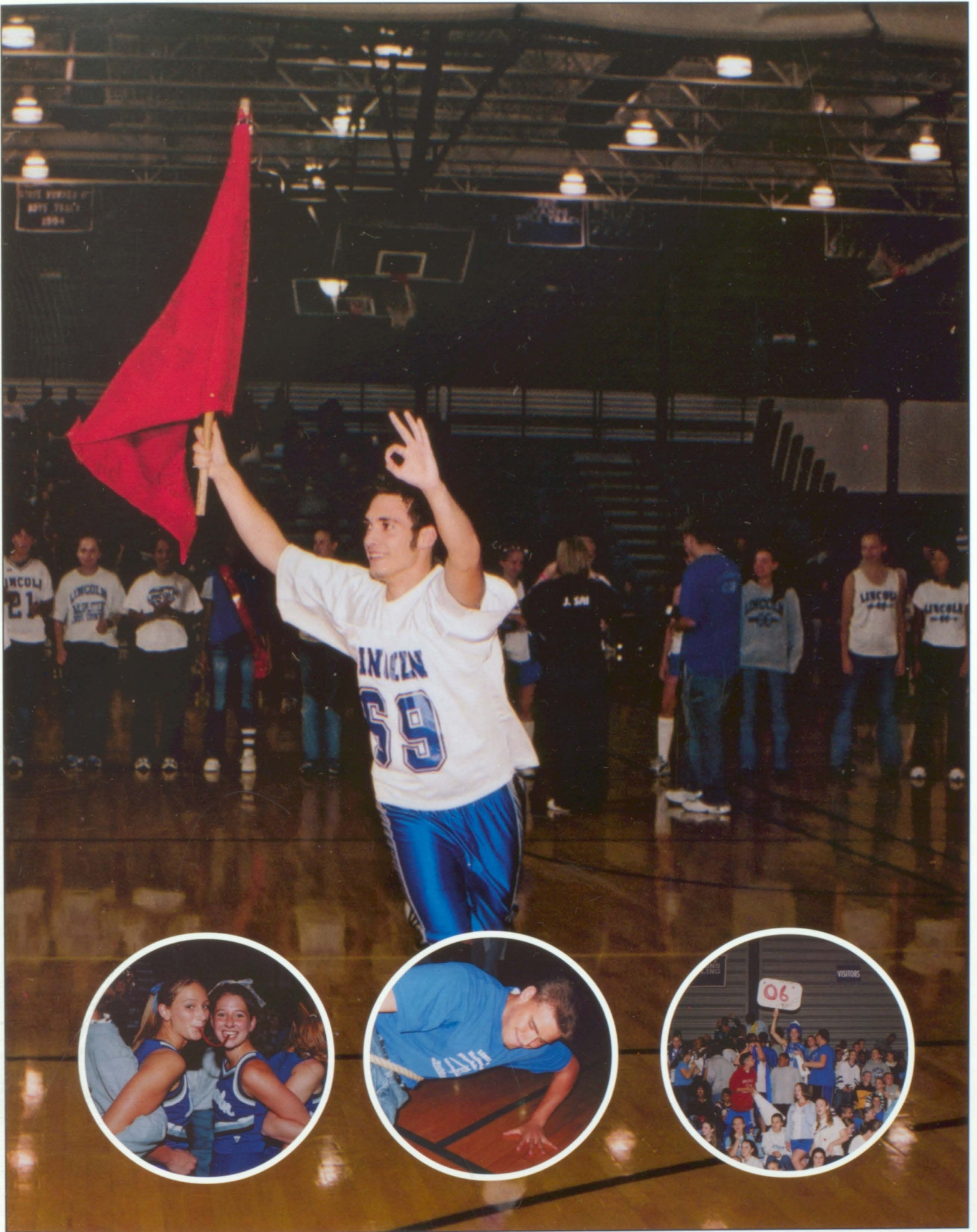


Our Time... to Grow

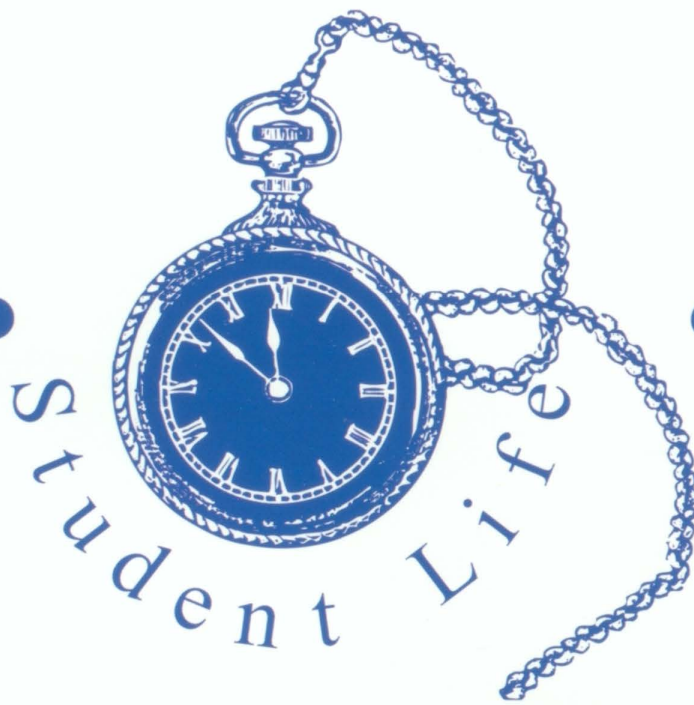

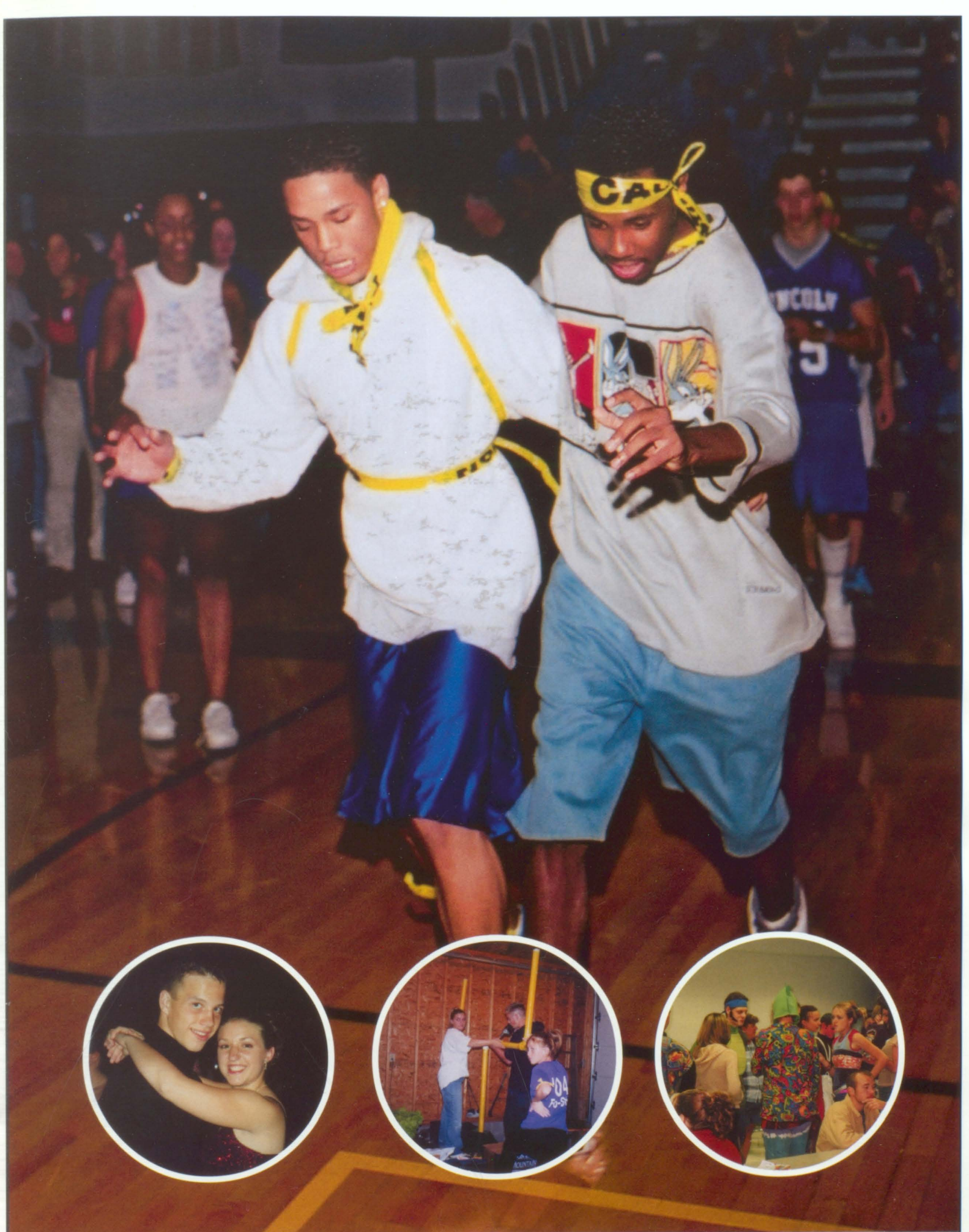




The Time of Our Lives

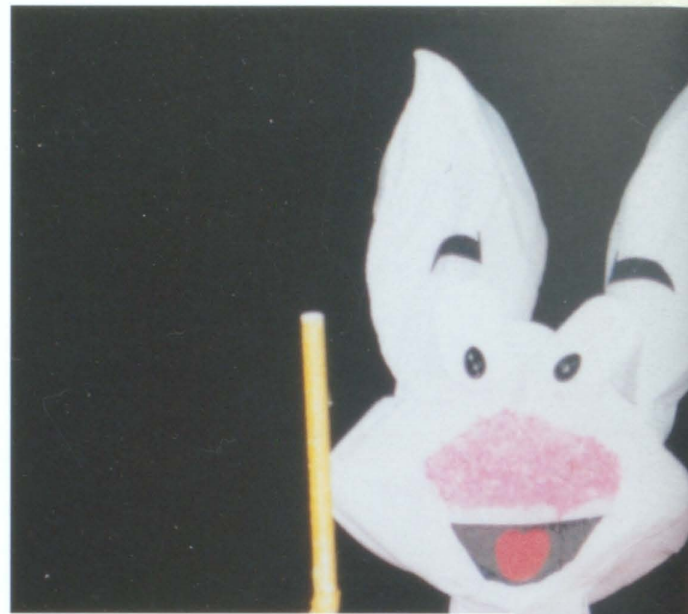

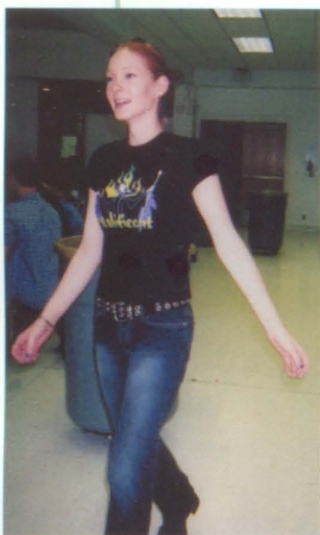

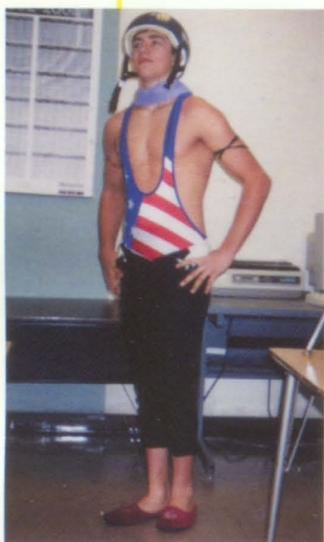

Art has numerous career options - teaching, computer graphics, all types of design, advertising, cartooning, culinary arts, plus many more.

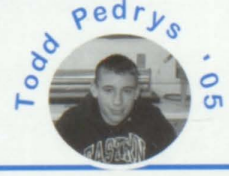

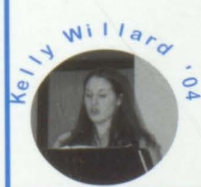
the competition has gotten nothing short of fierce.

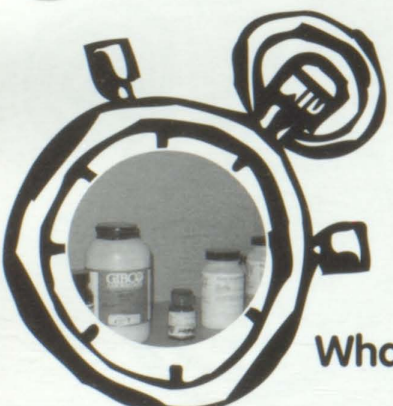
Science Labs are Full of Hazards

With science facilities that top most in the area, students are fortunate to have the opportunity to have hands-on experiments with equipment used in actual science labs.

As a result, the science department has occasional accidents. Lab safety is taught first.

Students must pay for broken equipment ranging in prices from a 35-cent test tube to a \$150 centigram balance. There is also a dry chemical room with 108 shelves full of hazardous chemicals. "One problem is the exposed gas pipes," said Ms. Maxwell.

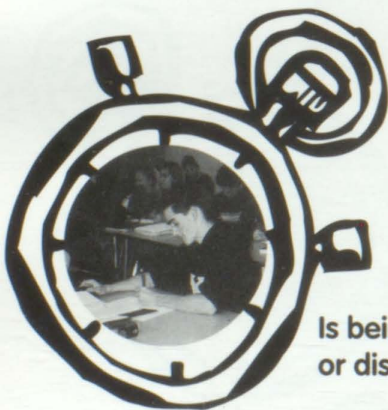
A major decision regarding Government was made this year, which will affect next year's juniors.

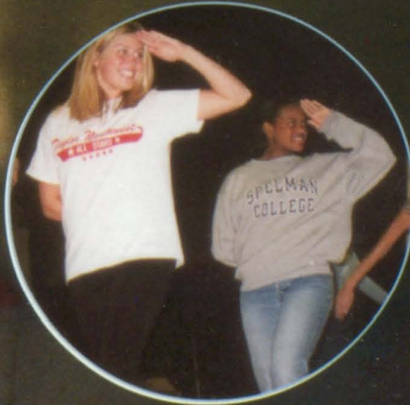
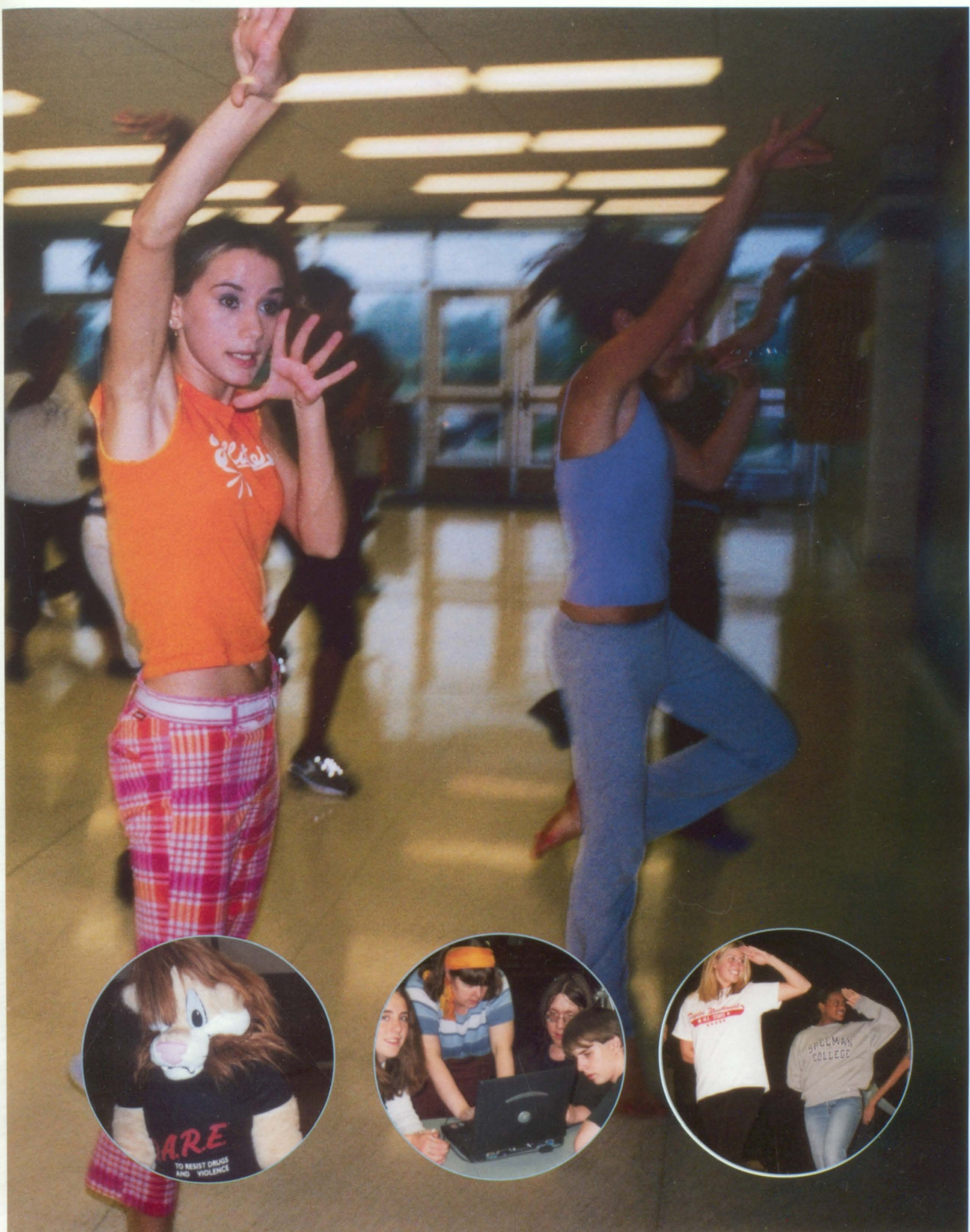
Passing the time

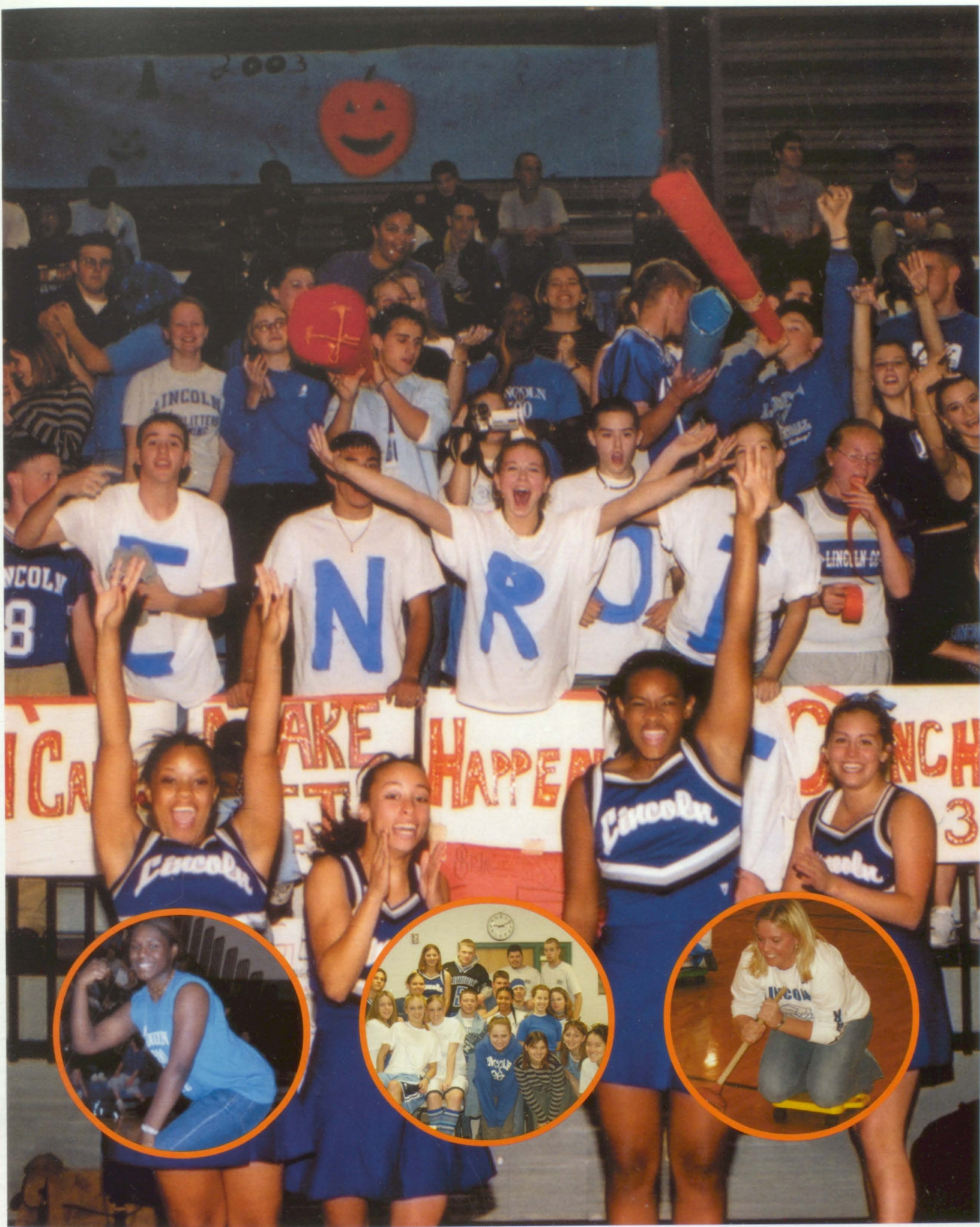


It's About... **Time**

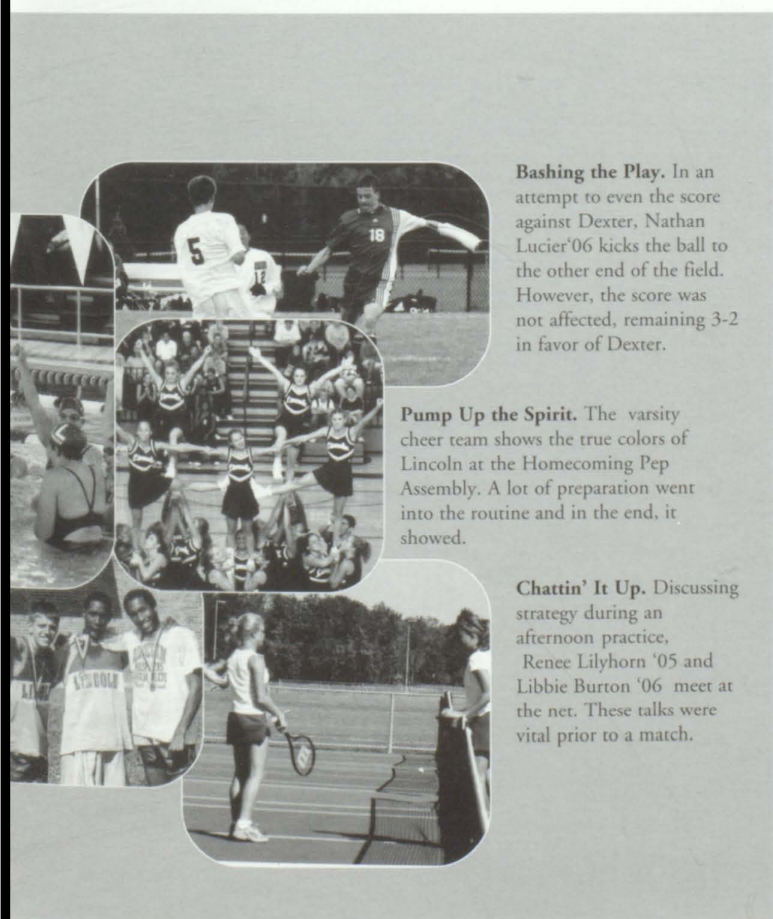

ing with less team members, based on how it will benefit the team.

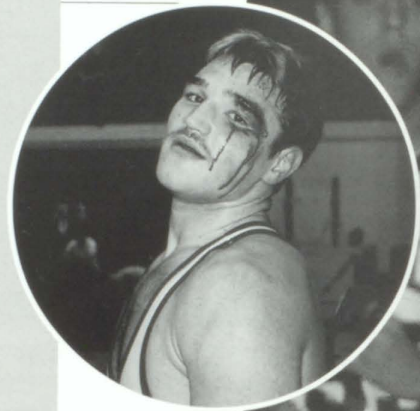

Winning and losing may have

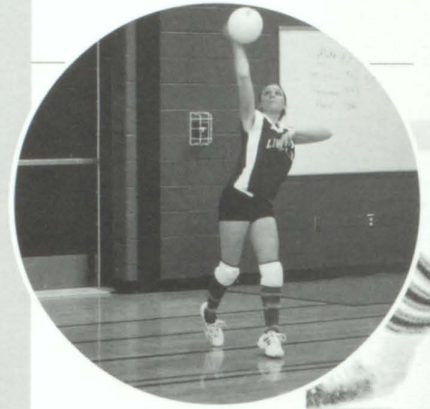

that privilege. It's all about using the person's abilities to the individual's and team's advantage.

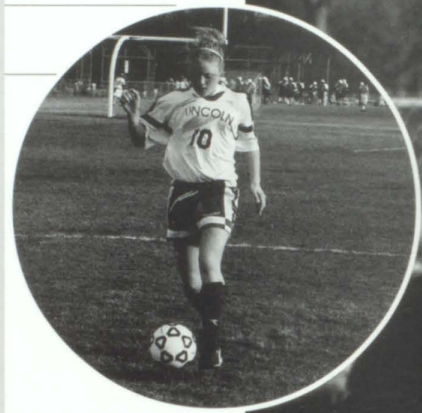

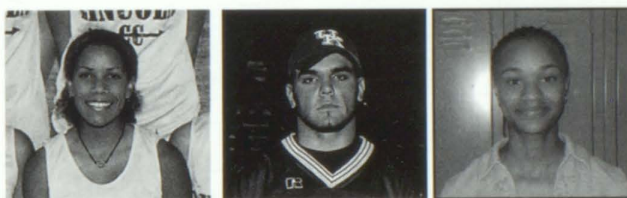

"I remember the time when the hockey team duct taped Mike Ellis [a junior], put him in a hockey bag and sent him up the elevator," said Steven Lore '03.

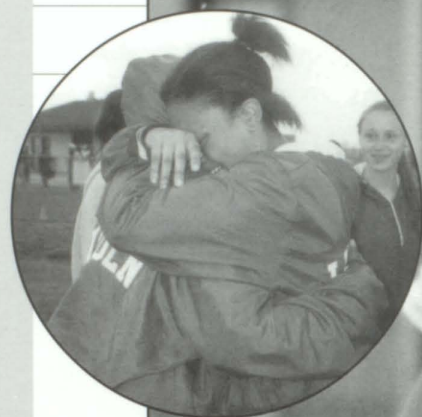

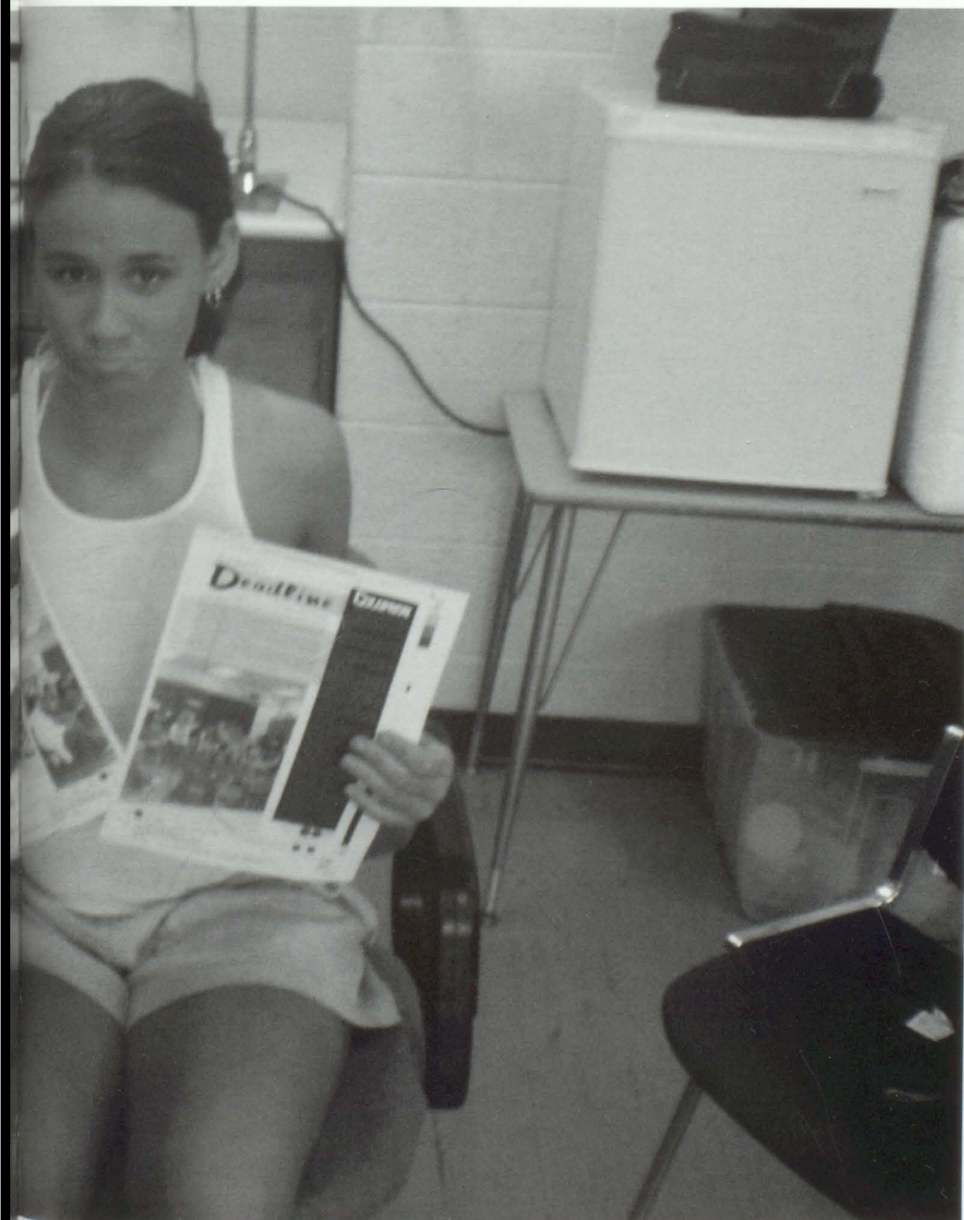
YEARBOOK PULLS IT OFF AGAIN... ONLY BETTER

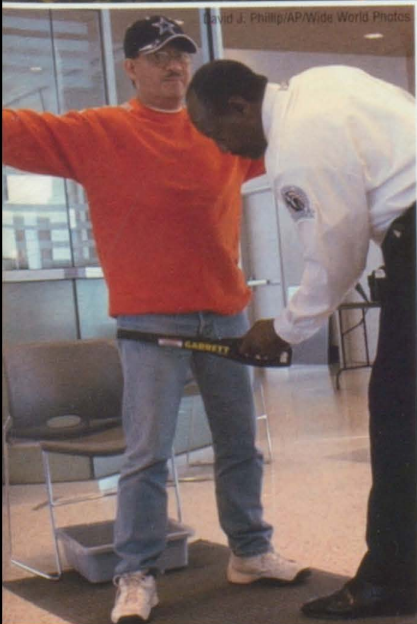

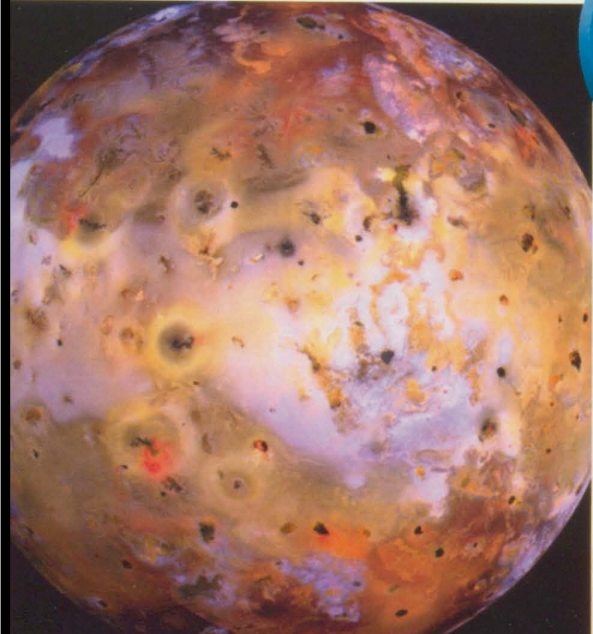

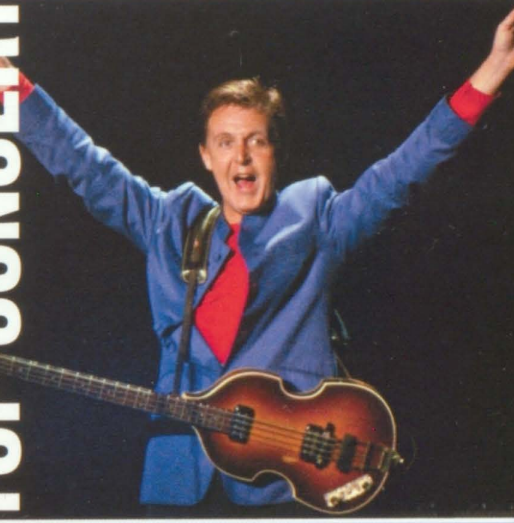

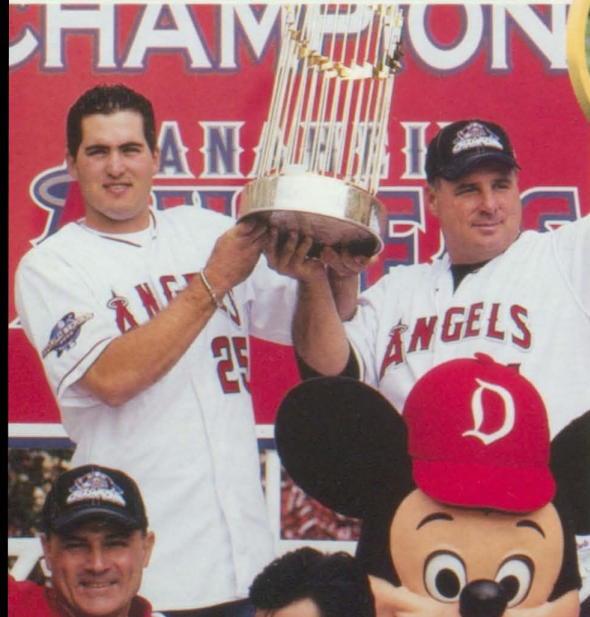

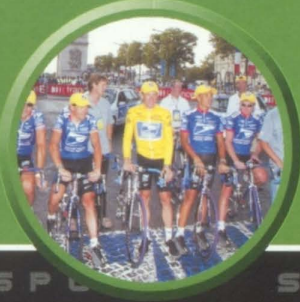

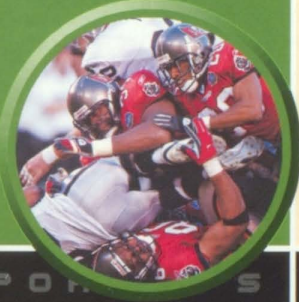
